Time to Reflect

Do not be afraid...

I don't know about you, but telling me not to do something isn't always the best way to make it happen. Don't be clumsy, oops there goes that glass of water. Don't eat cake, but it looked so tasty and I couldn't help it. Don't think of an elephant. I reckon you are thinking of an elephant, I am.

So, I wonder, when the angel told Mary not to be afraid and then when those same words were echoed to Joseph, do I think that meant they weren't afraid at all? I'm not sure I do, if I am going to be really honest with you.

Do not be afraid...

What does that mean if actually, we are very much afraid? If fear is something that we are struggling to switch off from? If even the mention of it brings it rushing to the front of our mind?

I might have my doubts about whether Joseph and Mary were without fear despite being told not to be, but I have no doubt that they took reassurance from those words that gave them the strength to follow God's plan. You see I think we can be afraid and still continue to move forward in faith. I think we can be afraid and find the reassurance in God that does not let fear win. I think we can be afraid and at the same time incredibly courageous.

As we make our final preparations to celebrate God with us, I am not going to tell you not to be afraid. I am going to encourage you to have courage, to be assured of God with you and to follow where God leads. For God is with us, even in the fear-filled shadows of the night and longing of our souls.

Matthew 1: 18-25, NRSV

¹⁸ Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹ Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. ²⁰ But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹ She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.' ²² All this took place to fulfil what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

²³ 'Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel', which means, 'God is with us.' ²⁴ When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, ²⁵ but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.
